Program

Ken Bartels introduced son Jake Meding, Director of Development for the Pulmonary Fibrosis Foundation (PFF), headquartered in Chicago. Jake became involved after his father-in-law as well as his grandfather, succumbed to Pulmonary Fibrosis. This interstitial lung disease results in fibrosis (scarring) of

the lung walls, making them stiffer and difficult for oxygen to diffuse into the blood system.

These cases are not cancer and they are not infectious. While there are many different types of pulmonary fibrosis, they all share dry, bothersome cough, fatigue, shortness of breath, poor quality life, and a need for supplemental oxygen. The disease has a progressive course and a high mortality rate. Although pulmonary fibrosis is much more common in older adult males, about 429 per 100,000 adults over the age of 70 in the US are living with the disease.

The Foundation is concentrating on the care given to Pulmonary Fibrosis patients and research efforts. Fifty thousand cases are diagnosed every year in the US and the Foundation is working to expand the existing network of regional Pulmonary Fibrosis care centers to more US hospitals through the exchange of data on cases from outlying hospitals.

Factors such as the environment and genetics are thought to be contributing causes. Research is key to understanding the cause and developing treatment. While the disease is not a virus, having up-to-date vaccinations is important to reduce the odds of this disease. Thanks, Jake, and thanks to Jessica Shore, RN, PhD, for describing the Foundation's efforts and for answering our numerous questions.
